to confidence — through interactive exercises and impromptu challenges. The event reminded everyone that communication is a skill built through persistence, reflection, and practice.



Brookes.Rus

Since the beginning of the academic year, Brookes. RUS Grades 1-4 (Y3-Y6) students have been following the FSES curriculum with great interest, attention and diligence. Last week, they began their interim assessments in Russian Language and Mathematics. Next, they will take diagnostic tests in the World Around Us and English Language. We are confident that our students will achieve excellent results and wish them every success.

The children's activity, creativity and vivid imagination help them make significant academic progress. For example, Grade 1 (Y3) completed a creative project on the topic 'Circle', transforming plain cotton pads into toys. Using natural materials, the students made autumn-themed cut-outs and had great fun creating mosaic patterns.

Our Grade 2 (Y4) students learned to convey the poetic mood, comparing how different authors, such as F. Tyutchev, A. Nekrasov, S. Yesenin and A. Fet, describe the same season.








Grade 3 (Y5) students are already capable of tackling complex issues such as the administrative and territorial division of Russia. They can locate the constituent entities of the Russian Federation on a map and identify the capitals of the regions.

Our Grade 4 (Y6) students completed a 'Russia is our Motherland' creative project, using outline maps.

Participating in various maths competitions and quizzes has become a cherished tradition for the children. The recent intellectual game, 'Mystery of the Multi-Digit Number,' was also exciting and engaging.

The youngest Brookes.RUS students, the pre-school group (Y2), made shadow hand puppets, an activity that helps develop fine motor skills. They also explored celestial bodies such as the Sun, Earth and Moon.


Interestingly, the stellar theme also captures the imagination of our oldest students in Grade 6 (Y8). In their maths lessons, they completed their study of 'Ratios, Proportions and Scale' with a handson project of a model of the Solar System. The students analysed the actual distances from the Sun to the planets and their diameters, converted



the data into convenient units of measurement and discussed how to fit all the objects on a sheet of paper. They came to an important conclusion: to make the model both accurate and illustrative, they would need two different scales — one for the planets' sizes and another for the distances between them. It is worth noting that Julia Artamonova, a Visual Arts teacher from our international programme, is going to assist us in developing the visual part of the project.

Grade 5 (Y7) tried their hand at completing the computer-based diagnostic assessment of the Moscow Centre for Quality Education (MCQE). This assessment helps determine the level of functional literacy, including reading, science and maths. The children successfully mapped out a route to their destination, calculated the time it would take to travel using different modes of transport and determined the average temperature





based on the input data. Our Grade 5 did an excellent job with both the practical and theoretical tasks.

In Literature, the students made a journey to the Borodino battlefield and were introduced to Mikhail Lermontov's 'Borodino' poem. They learned a lot of interesting facts about the events of the Patriotic War of 1812 and even discovered the meaning of such rare words as 'canister shot', 'redoubt' and 'bivouac'.

Grade 6 (Y8) continued their study of 'Dubrovsky', a novel by Alexander Pushkin. In their literature lessons, Grade 6 students immersed themselves in the world of the 19th-century nobility, learning about the lives of landowners and peasants through Alexander Pushkin's work.

During their biology lesson, our Grade 5 (Y7) students made a cell model, going from textbook theory to a 3D model! Using air-dry clay, our young biologists assembled an animal cell piece by piece, while Grade 6 (Y8) students planted onion sets and watched them sprout. Young biologists at work! In class, they examined the development of plants, and in practice, they observed the growth of the root system and onion leaves.

We also have an important 'historical' announcement. Our students have a new history teacher, Mr. Sergey Alferov, an experienced educator and a graduate of Lomonosov Moscow State University. Mr. Alferov has been teaching history in our school's international programme for many years, and he is delighted to share his knowledge with the students of the Russian programme.



Key Centre

The Key Centre is guided by the school's ethos of 'Unlocking Student Potential.' It's not only about learning English faster or doing better in tests, but about building well-rounded students that use their strengths in their day-to-day school life. We are delighted to have the support of our wider faculty that embrace students' individual talents, providing greater access to the Arts and Sports in particular. These opportunities go a long way to 'Unlock Student Potential.'

Staff within the Key Centre play a vital role in promoting student wellbeing. Last week, our Upper/Senior School Psychologist, Ms Olesia Oleinik, delivered an assembly to the students on public speaking. Such a skill will be necessary for the vast majority of our students in the future. By sharing her expertise and knowledge, Ms Oleinik demonstrated our emphasis on supporting our students holistically, not only academically.



The word 'progress' is quite the buzzword in the Key Centre. Our teachers love to say it because it is the aim of every lesson. When thinking about what they think or feel when their students make progress, Ms Olga Shuvaeva said, "I feel proud and driven when I see my students make progress." Ms Victoria Kremneva remarked, "My students' progress motivates me to provide the best education possible". I couldn't agree more.



Boarding
